

A Brief History of First Lutheran Church and It's Recent Building Program

On June 11, 1884 a group of about 35 Swedes met and organized what was then called the Swedish Lutheran Church. In the fall of that year, the corner stone was laid for the first church which was located at 19th Street and Avenue D. This served as the church home until 1924 when a new church was constructed on the south side of 25th Street between Avenues A and B.

This church, now known as First Evan. Lutheran Church was completed and dedicated on September 14, 1924 and served this congregation until 1966. On June 19, 1966 the final worship service was held in this house of worship. This property was sold in March of 1966 for a service station.

It was at the annual congregational meeting in January, 1956 that talk was first begun about the need for larger facilities to serve our people and community. Discussion was based around an addition at the present site (25th St. and Ave. B) or relocation and building a complete new facility. At a special meeting held April 6, 1956 it was voted to buy land in north east Kearney, our present site for a futuure new church.

In 1958 a new parsonage was constructed across from the church site at a total cost, including land, of \$19,875. At this time the former parsonage was converted to a Parish House and served the congregation in this manner for eight years.

In 1961 an additional piece of land on the south end of our new church site was purchased, given us an entire block for our future church needs. This gave us a total of approximately 4 acres.

On November 20, 1964 a special congregational dinner meeting was held at the college dining hall to approve the general plans for the new church. Plans were presented by Helleberg and Helleberg, the architect selected for the new church.

Bids were accepted on the new church in August of 1965 and Approved by the congregation in September of that year. The following men were appointed to be the Building Committee. Kenneth Carlson, Chairman, Robert Schroeder, Vice-chairman, Harold Forsberg, Otto Olsen and Charles Stiefvater.

Ground breaking was held on September 12th, with about 175 members and friends present. Construction got under way in October of 1965. The corner stone was laid on July 3, 1966.

Since we had sold our old property and had to vacate in June of 1966, arrangements were made with the Kearney Public School to use Emerson School gym for services for a period of six months June to December 1966.

The first services were held in the new church on Christmas eve, 1966 even though the church was far from finished, but a beautiful service was held with candle lights only since we had no lights and no furnishings in the church.

The church as now completed contains a nave seating 350 worshippers plus 35 in the choir loft. Directly behind the nave is the fellowship hall which will seat over 200 at tables and also serves as an overflow for the church so a total of over 600 could be accommodated at a service.

The church has a large lounge which serves also as a part of the narthex. There is a secretary's office and work room, Pastors study and choir room. The church has three storage rooms. The kitchen off the fellowship hall is very adequate with all new furnishings and equipment.

To the east of the church is a large outdoor patio for outdoor social events in nice weather. The education wing to the south contains a Church School Office, Youth Room and 16 class rooms. The church with the exception of the Education wing is fully air conditioned.

. There is also a formal garden area and patio on the west entrance to the church. A free standing open bell tower is also at the front entrance. The bell in the tower is the one from the old church.

The organ in the church is the organ from the old church, a Reuter organ. A new rank of pipes have been added along with chimes. This organ is now 18 years old.

The church is constructed so that no steps are found in the church where people move about. A parking lot to accommodate 75 cars is located to the east of the church and cut-in parking will be added for about 40-50 cars when the street to the east of the church is paved this summer.

Architect for the Church was Helleberg and Helleberg of Kearney. General contractor, was the Britton Construction Co. of Lexington; Mechanical contractor, Anderson Bros. of Kearney and Electrical contractor, Kelly Electric also of Kearney.

The total cost of the program including land, paving, parking lot and side walks, landscaping, general, mechanical and electrical contracts, all carpeting and furniture, kitchen furnishings and architect fees, speaking system and drapes plus moving and adding to pipe organ will be approximately \$355,000. The debt is approximately \$140,000.

Present membership of First Lutheran Church includes 639 confirmed members and 319 children for a total of 958 souls.



We wish to thank the many persons and groups, who under God's gracious guidance have contributed in so many ways to the completion of our building program. It is impossible to list all the names as so many have made fine contributions materially as well as gifts of time and talents.

A large number of gifts and memorials have been received for various items of furnishings in the church and we plan to list all these in a "Book of Remembrance" that will be placed in the narthex in the near future. We hope you will have an opportunity to look through this soon.

As we join in this Service of Dedication we join in thanking God for His Mercy and lovingkindness and look forward to the opportunity of serving Him in this community and throughout the Church.
