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

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Editor's Note:

A Nebraska origin is not claimed for the proverbs and sayings in this pamphlet. They are, however, used in Nebraska, and have been collected by field workers on the project, volunteer contributors, grade and high school pupils over the State. They have been confirmed by numerous consultants, persons of all ages and occupations. The more familiar this material is to Nebraskans the more truly does it merit its place in Nebraska folklore, and the more its value will increase with the passing of time.

WEATHER SIGNS

A clear sunset is a sign of fair weather for the next day.

If muskrats build large thick houses the winter will be severe.

If animals have heavy fur coats the winter will be severe.

Green in a cloud indicates hail.

If hair curls more than usual it is a sign of rain.

A red sunrise is a sign of rain.

If you can hang a powder horn on the lower part of the crescent moon the weather will be rainy.

Mackeral sky, mackeral sky,
 Never long wet, never long dry.

If all the food on the table is eaten the next day will be fair.

If a rooster crows before he goes to bed,
 He will get up with a wet head.

Sunset red and morning gray
 Sends the traveler on his way.
 Sunset gray and morning red
 Keeps the traveler to his bed.

If the sunset is red the following day will be windy.

If smoke goes straight up the day will be fair.

A red sunrise foretells rain before the day is over.

If it rains before 10 o'clock it will rain every day for a week.

Rain before seven, quit before eleven.

A ring around the moon is a sign of storm and the number of stars within the ring indicates the number of days before the storm.

If pigs gather straw it is a sign of storm.

If swallows fly close together it is a sign of storm.

Rainbow at night, sailors' delight,
Rainbow in the morning, sailors take warning.

Thick corn husks foretell a severe winter.

A black Christmas, a full graveyard.

If it rains on Easter Sunday it will rain for the following **seven** Sundays.

Rain when the sun shines, rain all day tomorrow.

The one who takes the last piece of bread or cake on the plate will remain single. The one who takes the next to the last piece will marry a rich mate.

Three times a bridesmaid, never a bride.

It is bad luck to take off the wedding ring.

Peel an apple without allowing the peeling to break. Holding it in your right hand over your head, circle it around you three times and drop it over your left shoulder. The letter it forms is the initial of your future husband.

Hold a burning match. The burned end will turn toward your sweetheart.

If you find a stem in your tea it indicates a beau. The length indicates his height. Bite it and lay it near the thumb of your left hand.
